Benefits of the treatment

The aim of the treatment is to try and improve the vision in your child's lazy eye. Your child has been given atropine eye drops to treat a lazy eye. Atropine is inserted into the good eye only. This enlarges the pupil and blurs the vision encouraging the use of the lazy eye.

If your child wears glasses these may be changed to enhance the effect of the treatment. A new pair of glasses will be prescribed and should be worn full time. The original glasses need to be kept for when atropine treatment is stopped. **Please bring both pairs of glasses with you to every appointment.**

Instructions

1. Wash your hands before and after using the atropine.
2. Insert one drop into the eye, as prescribed, until your next appointment. If you think that the drop missed the eye, it is safe to try again, however, two drops do not work better than one.
3. As the vision improves the use of the atropine may be changed under the instruction of the ophthalmic team.
4. You will be seen regularly, whilst on treatment.

Possible side effects

As with most medicines some side effects may occur:

- Itchy or swollen eyelids
- Red or watery eyes
- Dryness of skin/mouth
- Fever
- Flushing of face
- Restlessness
- Hyperactivity
- Irritability
- Vomiting
- Increased temperature
- Light sensitivity

If any of the above occurs, contact your doctor or the Eye unit.

Points to remember

- Store atropine in safe place out of the reach of children.
- Store at normal room temperature.
- Be careful not to get atropine into your own eye as it could blur your vision. Always wash your hands before and after you insert the drops.
- The atropine has been prescribed for your child and should not be given to any other person.
- Inform your child's school about the use of the drops and the dilated pupil.
- If you miss an appointment phone for another appointment as soon as possible.

Please ensure that any doctor or dentist treating your child is aware that atropine is being used.
