Introduction

Your wound site has been closed using stitches or skin staples/glue.

- You will be contacted by a district nurse from your GP surgery who will remove the stitches/skin staples seven days following the procedure.
- Keep your wound dry and covered with a dressing until the stitches or staples are removed.
- You can bathe following stitch/staple removal. Gently dab the wound site dry with a clean towel.
- The scar will take approximately six months to fade.
- Excessive movement at the wound site should be avoided.
- Avoid wearing tight clothing that could rub and cause you some discomfort over the wound site.
- Do not use any perfume/ cosmetic deodorant or any tanning products near or at the wound site.

If you experience any of the following:

- The wound has increased swelling, redness or oozing.
- The wound edge is showing signs of separation or the skin appearing thinner over the pacemaker/loop recorder.
- If you have a raised temperature (over 37.5 centigrade, 99.5 Fahrenheit).
